The advertised dinner speaker, Moira Kelly, was unfortunately ill, but sent along her inspiring son Ahmed, a Paralympian, who wowed the audience with his enthusiasm for life, so much so that as one person remarked, his mother was not missed at all!



Her Excellency the Honourable Linda Dessau AM, Governor of Victoria

On 1 July 2015, the Honourable Linda Dessau AM was sworn in as Victoria's 29th Governor, the first female in the role. Governor Dessau was born in Melbourne in 1953, and was educated at St Catherine's Girls' School, matriculating in 1969, before attending the University of Melbourne, where she gained the degree of LLB (Hons). In 1975 she was admitted as a barrister and solicitor of the Supreme Court of Victoria. She was appointed a Magistrate in 1986 and a Judge of the Family Court of Australia in 1995, serving for 18 years.

Immediately before her appointment as Governor, she was President of the Melbourne Festival, Chair of the Winston Churchill Memorial Trust Victorian Regional Committee and a national Board member of the Trust, a Commissioner of the Australian Football League, a Trustee of the National Gallery of Victoria, a Board member and former Chair of AFL Sportsready and Artsready, a Board member of the Unicorn Foundation, and a Patron of Sports Connect.

In 2010 the Governor was made a Member of the Order of Australia for services to family law, and the community.



Annual General Meeting

This was held during the conference, with President Coral Ross providing an overview of the last year's activities. There were no elections, as office bearers serve for two years, but a swap of positions, with Jennifer Yang becoming treasurer, and Felicity Frederico the Metro Representative. Long serving committee member Helen Relph announced her resignation from the committee, which was accepted with regret. Helen was responsible for organising a number of functions for us, including the 60th anniversary at Old Government House Canberra in 2011, and more recently, the historic photo at the Melbourne Town Hall. We will miss her wise and generous assistance.

The committee subsequently seconded Cr Meghan Hopper of Moreland Council to Helen Relph's position.

Meghan is a strong supporter of women, formerly worked for Emily's List, and is completing a PhD in journalism and the representation of women candidates in federal elections. She is currently Moreland Mayor, (only the second in its history) and the Councillor responsible for the Status of Women. We hope Meghan enjoys her time on the committee.

Networking luncheons




Publication

From the Archives

Our first ever Newsletter was issued in June 1964, and a copy is held at the National Library in Canberra (Figure 1).



This first issue consisted of three typewritten pages, and was prepared by the then secretary Jean Manning of Hawthorn. The treasurer was Mrs J. Miller of Parkville, and the annual membership subscription was one guinea – one pound one shilling, equivalent to \$2.10. At that time there were 31 women Councillors, and they were listed. The Newsletter was issued after the Bendigo conference and contained details of some of the activities during the conference. Those in attendance included Alderman Marjorie Propsting, president of the NSW Branch, Mrs N. Cameron, national president of the C.W.A. and Mrs G.N. Frost, president of the National Council of Women. One of the topics for discussion was the franchise, because it was limited at that time. Members debated whether we should support full adult franchise with compulsory voting or without compulsory voting, and it was decided that the president, Mrs. Hallenstein (a lawyer) should draft a questionnaire for the members to complete. (It was 1982 before the full adult franchise was legislated.)
